Shabbat Shalom

The MiSheberach

This is often considered the most traditional prayer for one who is ill. It is usually recited during the Torah service at synagogue. Offering to say it at someone's bedside is also very comforting and healing. The individual's Hebrew name is often included in this blessing. The name is inserted in the blanks provided and it usually includes the person's mother's Hebrew name, as well.

May the One who blessed our forefathers Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and our foremothers Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah, bless and heal this person, _____ the son/daughter of _____. May the Holy One, blessed be God, be merciful and strengthen and heal him/her and give him/her life. Grant him/her a complete recovery—healing of body and healing of soul. And let us say: Amen.
