The Second Adar

The year of 5774 is a year that is called "pregnant" and in it there are two months of Adar. Why do we double the month of Adar? And, are the two months of Adar really one month that is 60 days long? Or are they two separate months? Where are the holidays and the mitzvoth assigned according to the halakha? For example, is the hillula of Moshe Rabbenu in Adar placed in Adar Alef or Adar Bet?

The Hebrew calendar is based on the sun and the moon. In the lunar year, months follow the cycle of the moon. They begin with each new moon and are 29 or 30 days long—30 days being a leap month. In comparison, the solar calendar has 30 or 31 days per month. Therefore, a twelve-month lunar year has 354 days while the comparable solar year has 365 days. So, the lunar year is approximately 11 days longer than the solar one.

Even though Jewish months are lunar months (we celebrate Rosh Hodesh, the new month, with each new moon), the Jewish holidays fall according to the seasons of the year which follow the sun. Therefore, if we don't add an extra month on occasion,

and rely solely on the lunar calendar, the holidays would eventually move around and occur in different seasons. For example, that is how the Muslim calendar works; the holidays move around. Since in Judaism holidays should occur in specific seasons of the year, every three or four years we add an extra lunar month to push the holidays back into the right season. This extra month is the second month of Adar, which occurs this year.

So, if there are two Adars, Adar Alef and Adar Bet, when do we celebrate special occasions and holidays that fall during Adar? According to Jewish law, or halakha, the holidays in the month of Adar should be celebrated during the 2nd Adar, not the 1st one. Therefore, Purim is celebrated in Adar Bet. Also, if a child was born during a regular year, with one Adar, he or she celebrates a Bar/Bat Mitzvah during Adar Bet, the second Adar. However, if a child is born in a leap year during the first Adar, Adar Alef, then the Bar/Bat Mitzvah is then celebrated during Adar Alef.

There is also the question of yahrzeit anniversaries. Generally, the yahrzeit of a person who passed away in a regular year, a year with only one Adar, is most often observed in the second Adar. However, some have the custom of observing these yahrzeits in the first and second Adar as well.
