## A Letter from Rabbi Melhado

To the wonderful Kahal Joseph Congregation, shalom uvrakhah!

With the holiday of Shavuot coming up soon, I would like to take a few moments to express my humble excitement that you have asked me to join you as your new rabbi. I feel privileged at the chance to plant my

budding family among yours and grow together as a community. Jessica, Penny, and I look forward to getting to know you all, and to sharing many special occasions together.

Shavuot is a time of extraordinary anticipation. Our ancestors, the ancient Israelites, left behind slavery in Egypt to receive the Torah, but God did not give it to us immediately. Rather, He waited for 50 days so that we could prepare ourselves for the incredible transformation that we were about to undergo. In order to be truly ready, we had to make an important mental shift between being forced to serve a taskmaster and freely serving God. The Shibbole HaLeket quotes a Midrash that the Israelites were so excited to make this transition that they counted up each day towards the time when they could come to know the Torah: "now one day has passed; now two days have passed," and so on until Shavuot. It is in remembrance of this, says



the Midrash, that counting the Omer was established for all Jews in all times.

Reading this story during this year's Omer, I feel an extra sense of identity with our forefathers. In roughly 50 days, I will pack up my life in New York – which was no slavery, but still quite rigorous – and move to a new life of sharing Torah with you in Los Angeles. I will cross a real desert just like the

Israelites, and come to a land where a thriving Jewish community was built by immigrants. Most exciting of all, I will be invited to partake in the beautiful Baghdadi rite that has been preserved across many countries and family migrations, and lovingly cherished at Kahal.

I have a dual sense of reverence and animation at being asked to take part in the communal life of this outstanding kehillah, and I warmly thank every single person who had a hand in bringing me there. I am literally counting up the days to be able to join you, and to share in the Torah whose anniversary we will be celebrating this coming Yom Tov.
