

Rabbi's Message It All Starts with the Alef-Bet

This vacation has been challenging for me because one of its goals has been to clean out my childhood treasures from



As we were going through the boxes, a beautiful relic from my past caught my eye: a little blue workbook from 1987 in which I had first learned the Hebrew alphabet. It was touching to see this booklet through the lens of my life today: while I am now so blessed as to lead a Jewish congregation of 300 member families, 30 years ago I could hardly even write the alphabet!

Looking at this little artifact of my childhood, I immediately made a connection to Bene Yisrael in this week's parashah. We often don't think about this, but when God commanded them to make the Miskhan with all of its finery and rituals, they were not that far removed from total ignorance of the most basic principles of Judaism. Just 21 chapters ago (Ex. 6:9), they

could not even take Moshe's promise of liberation seriously, and now we see them laying the foundations for a detailed ritual display that was

This got me thinking about what it might have been like for them to be the first people to receive the Torah. On the one hand, they were probably bubbling with excitement to get a taste of our new spiritual heritage. But on the other hand, it must have seemed painfully slow with everyone starting out as illiterate former slaves. How could they possibly have achieved a goal like making the Miskhan when their first voices of Torah scholarship were as remedial as a child's humble workbook?!

But achieve it they did, down to every last detail, to every last piece of clothing and every special ritual action. Our Kohanim and Levi'im really were up to the challenge, and when push came to shove, they put in the hard work and reaped

the rewards when it counted the most. And it all started from the humble building blocks of the Hebrew language, out of which anything can be built if only we try hard enough.

Some of the Israelites were old, or feeble, or didn't have much free time, or experienced any of the myriad of obstacles that might have stood in their way. But they wanted to know what it meant to be a Jew, and they knew that they had to do it in the language that God used to communicate His will.

So they learned it, from the youngest children to the most aged adults. They struggled with it, they made it their own, and enough of them mastered it that they were able to do astonishing things with it. Enough of them mastered it that we are still talking about what they used it to do 3,000 years after the fact.

And it all started with the alef-bet.

Rabbi Asher Lopatin

Rabbi Asher Lopatin is the president of Yeshivat Chovevei Torah Rabbinical School, an Orthodox rabbinical school that teaches an inclusive, open and welcoming Torah. Previously, he was the spiritual leader of Anshe Sholom B'nai Israel Congregation, a modern Orthodox synagogue in Chicago, for 18 years. He received his ordination from Rav Ahron Soloveichik and Yeshivas Brisk in Chicago, and from Yeshiva University, as a Wexner Graduate Fellow. A Rhodes Scholar with a M.Phil. in Medieval Arabic Thought from Oxford University, Rabbi Lopatin is the author of numerous scholarly and popular articles.

Rabbi Chaim Marder

Rabbi Chaim Marder has served as the Rabbi of the Hebrew Institute of White Plains since 1995, having formerly served as the Rabbi of Congregation Beth Sholom in Providence, RI and associate rabbi at the Hebrew Institute of Riverdale. He is a graduate of Yeshiva University, holds a Masters degree in Jewish History, and received his Rabbinical Ordination from RIETS, the rabbinical seminary of YU. He has served as a Vice President of the Rabbinical Council of America (RCA) and the Westchester Board of Rabbis, and is a member of the board of both the RCA and IRF (the International Rabbinic Fellowship). In addition to his work at the Hebrew Institute, he is a faculty member in the Department of Leadership and Professional Rabbinic Training at YCT Rabbinical School.

He and his wife Suzie have 7 children: Shira (and Jason Saibel); Ari. Akiva, Shoshanah, Ayelet, Yonina and Doni.
