KOL MEVASSER

Rabbi's Message

Blood, guts, and fire – the opening words of Sefer Vayikra are dripping with the butchery of animal sacrifice. From our perspective it can sometimes be difficult to relate to this theme as it dominates the next two *parashiyot* and recurs across the rest of the Torah.

The emphasis that Judaism places on sacrifice – which was central to ancient Israelite society and still holds a special position in our worship texts today (think Musaf) – demands that we take a second look and ask ourselves what meaning we can derive from the priestly cult in our lives.

To whet our appetite for a much deeper discussion than what is possible in the pages of Kol Mevasser, let us reflect on the conclusions of three important Parshanim (Biblical commentators):

The view of Maimonides (12th century Andalusia and North Africa) is that God instituted animal sacrifice to defeat the paganism of contemporary Biblical society. If the Egyptians venerated sheep and the Chaldeans revered goat-demons, then a Jewish worship calling for the slaughter of these animals would give the lie to idolatry and prove that there is only one single, all-powerful God. (Guide for the Perplexed, III:46)

In opposition to this, Nachmanides (13th century Catalonia) proposes that each stage of the sacrificial ritual is an expression of regret for sinful behavior. Since immoral speech first gives voice to a sin, we use moral speech to confess our shortcomings over the sacrifice. Since our inner thoughts sustain the sin in the world, we burn the internal organs that sustained the animal in the world. And since our arms and legs carry out the sin, we burn the limbs that once enacted the animal's will. (Commentary to Ex. 1:9)

Finally, the Sforno (16th century Papal States) suggests that the goal of the sacrifices is to draw closer to God by publicly expressing deference through an altruistic gift. Even now that there are no animal sacrifices, we can evoke the spirit of this idea through Hos. 14:3, which asks that "the prayers of our lips replace the sacrifice of cows." In other words, giving of ourselves sincerely in the service of God is an act that fulfills the intent of the sacrifices. (Commentary to Ex. 1:2)

Each of these positions is challenging, and solves only some of the problems inherent to a commandment that God never explains. Still, each gives us a different, rich model of what He might hope to see from us in the world – a goal towards which we can strive. As we read of these ancient practices, may they always overflow with inner meanings that can inspire us to leave the best possible imprint on the world!
