Rabbi's Message

A few weeks ago, a prominent Sephardic politician in Israel opposed the date of Yom Hashoa in a radio interview, declaring that the Israeli public holiday has no religious sanctity and "does not obligate us as Haredi Jews."

As reported in the Hebrew press, his

criticism of the date of the 27th of Nisan for Yom Hashoa breaks down into three parts. First, Nisan is supposed to be a happy month in which common forms of public mourning are forbidden. Second, the Israeli politicians who chose the 27th of Nisan were secular Jews whose decisions are religiously invalid. And third, the date of the 27th of Nisan was chosen due to its connection with the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising, an event that sparked deadly persecution because it symbolized Jewish resistance.

His alternative for a religiously acceptable Yom Hashoa was the 10th of Tebet. In 1948, the Chief Rabbinate declared that this fast day should serve as the "Yom Hakadish Hakelali," meaning that surviving relatives of Holocaust victims could use it as the Hazkara for family members if they did not know when they were killed. This seemed to resolve all of our politician's problems with the current Yom Hashoa: the date is three months before Nisan, it was chosen by Orthodox rabbis, and it had no connection to rash attempts at resistance.

How do these comments stand up to scrutiny? Looking first to the history, we see that the 10th of Tebet is by no means free of liberal Jewish hands. According to Dr. Hasia Diner, the single strongest organization in the US that pushed to make it Yom Hashoa was the Synagogue Council of America,



which has been described as "the only Jewish religious group in the nation in which the Orthodox, Conservative and Reform movements were represented." The SCA reportedly considered its success with the 10th of Tebet as "one of its most important achievements," and it resisted the Knesset's decision about the 27th of Nisan for many years.

I also wonder what our Sephardic politician would say about the origins of the Fast of Tebet, which commemorates the failure of an act of resistance by King Zedekiah against the murderous Nebuchadnezzar (see II Kings 24:18-25:4). While the Biblical account criticizes Zedekiah, we still mourn the collapse of his revolt on religious grounds. This logic might actually be quite comparable to a more recent event of similarly historic proportions, and even if the date were in Nisan, the Shulhan Arukh at least opens the door for exceptions to the rule against mourning (OH 429:2).

In fairness to our politician, there is an attraction to the idea of using the Jewish language of an ancient fast day to commemorate new tragedies. His positive arguments are on-point, which is why even the liberal American Jewish community supported the 10th of Tebet in the beginning.

But the question before us now is one of a post-facto nature: given that the Israeli government has held Yom Hashoa on the 27th of Nisan for over 60 years, what should be the response of Orthodox Jews in general, or of Sephardim in particular? Do we want our brand associated with belittling others and suppressing something that they cherish emotionally? Or do we want to find a way to build community at a moment when our fellow Jews are most vulnerable? I hope very much that the second answer carries the day, and that we respond to the destruction of our fathers by being constructive towards our brothers.
