Rabbi's Message

A hundred years ago this week, a series of diplomatic letters between Sir Edward Grey and Paul Cambon established an agreement between the British and French empires about how to divide up the Middle East if the Ottoman Empire fell in World War I. Popularly

known as the "Sykes-Picot Agreement," it is named for Mark Sykes and François Georges-Picot, the chief negotiators who hammered out the terms.

Its main goal was to ensure that the biggest winners of an Ottoman collapse would be the European Great Powers, whose strategic interests would be given first priority over local needs. If new countries were to be allowed to form, this could only be done in a way that served the British and French colonial systems, which between them governed half a billion subjects and more than 30% of the Earth's landmass. When combined with other partition plans favoring the Russian and Italian empires, even fewer pieces of the Ottoman pie would be left for the people actually living in the area.

Over the past century, the agreement has attracted a flood of criticism from many groups with a stake in the region, including religious and nationalistic ideologues; colonizers and the colonized; dreamers for peace and terrorists. The first to include an actual map of the terms, it left a visual impression on the post-war negotiations



that set the borders we now recognize. Many are still fighting over the depth of its legacy and how much attention should be paid to its role in shaping modern conflicts.

From this map that superimposes the modern borders onto the original terms, we can see that the frontiers between several modern states were first established in Sykes-Picot, including significant stretches of Syria's borders with Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, and Iraq; and Iran's western border. Because of this, Sykes-Picot is still a reference point in discussions of Middle East policy today, including among Zionists, who remember that Bolshevik Russia exposed the secret terms of the agreement in 1917 only three weeks after the Balfour Declaration.

The high-stakes background of Sykes-Picot has meant that the Jewish community tends not to remember the agreement through the eyes of Mizrahim who lived in the affected areas. As the first international accord to seriously contemplate what the world would look like after "Ottoman" disappeared as a national identity, it should have ranked indigenous Jews among its stakeholders, and the fact that it did not reflected a prevailing trend in global diplomacy that ultimately saw the end of their stately communal life. When push came to shove, the Great Powers put themselves first and made room for (mostly Muslim) local nationalism a distant second, leaving the Jews as an afterthought primarily focused on Israel.

While Sykes-Picot is likely not the cause of this problem, it is one of the first times that the diplomatic trends abetting the dispersion of Mizrahi Jewry were captured on paper. Several of our members ultimately left the region under conditions first anticipated by this agreement, signed (oddly enough) long before they were born. So in a year that mainly marks
