

Rabbi's Message

I sometimes wonder if my grandfather ever felt a little like Tselofehad in the mid 1960s and 1970s. With the older kids off at college, he was the lone remaining male figure in a very female house that overflowed with his second wife and six young



Like Tselofehad's daughters, my mother and her sisters stepped around some of the patriarchal expectations of society because there simply weren't a lot of men around to do things for them. Each grew up thinking for themselves, and they are a strong bunch who have led meaningful, interesting lives of their own choosing.

Their matriarch for the last 50 years was Alice, who married my grandfather only nine months after he lost my grandmother to breast cancer. Whatever one might say about her legitimate faults, I can only admire someone who would sign up for such a thing. She had two girls of her own, and had recently lost their father in the *USS Thresher*, the deadliest submarine sinking in history until today. Marrying my grandfather meant taking on seven new children – five of whom were still at home, and the eldest of whom was only 9 years her junior. It was no easy task to go from "interloper" to "Mom," and yet she took this on

when she could have chosen an easier pathway to restarting her life.

What touching symbolism that God would take her back to Him the week that the story of Tselofehad's daughters appears in the Torah! This even reflects the text itself, where the next passage addresses the anticipated death of Moshe Rabbenu. For the matron of a large family, it was a fitting point for her to ascend her own Har Ha'arabim and contemplate a future that would be carried forth by others.

"Alice," "Grandma Alice," and finally "Grandma" – the progression of the names that I called her reflects a bumpy pathway from distance to intimacy in our relationship. While our early connection was constrained by old stories that I neither knew nor understood, the Grandma that I will remember best is the one from our phone calls over the past decade.

I only spoke to her once every few months, but her elephantine memory would retain it all. We could resume past conversations effortlessly in the manner of old friends, and although her world and mine were quite different, she easily developed the cultural and factual language necessary to keep a stake in the game. She was widely read and had a universal wisdom that I found comforting and inspiring, even as I saw that she would never back down when she thought she was right, no matter how convincing the counter-evidence.

She was a special lady. Yehe zikhra barukh!
