Rabbi's Message

Hashabat Abeda is the positive mitsva to restore something to its rightful owner. God commands that once we notice something has been lost, we cannot ignore it, but must assume responsibility for the situation. Even if we don't know who left them behind,

we should protect valuable things that we find in case the owner comes looking for them.

While it's not a perfect analogy, this passage from Sefer Debarim (22:1-3) moved me when I had the opportunity to play a role in saving two precious items on behalf of our congregation. In neither case are we talking about a lost item, but I did feel a sense of "thou shalt not ignore" as I helped reunite two long-lost cultural treasures.

During my first few weeks on the job, a box of donated books got confused for a box of geniza books, and I was asked to judge whether it could be buried in the cemetery. I found it to contain a mixture of everyday books that had outlived their natural lives, and a handful of stunning antiquarian pamphlets that would have been impossible to replace. Preserving them in my office, I noticed that one was a pocket-sized "Exercise Book" from Shanghai full of handwritten *pizmonim* in Hebrew.

13 months later, I was idly looking through an online Judaica auction when the publication city of "Shanghai" caught my attention. I was astonished that the photograph on the website showed a page identical to one that I remembered from the manuscript. Using money from the Iraqi

Books Fund that we raised, I bought the book, the first half of which turned out to be a nearly word-forword match to the handwritten text in my office!

The published volume is called *Pizmonim Lesimhat* Torah, and the copy we now own is a 1935 reprint of the original of the same title that was first published in Bombay in 1885 by a Baghdadi Jew named Moshe Yehuda Cohen. Both it and the manuscript include special Iragi songs to be recited for each man who is called to the Torah, and while the manuscript ends there, the published book also goes on to cover more songs for other special occasions.

Each of these items by itself would be a jewel to a community like ours, whose founders include Baghdadi Jews that lived in an interconnected diaspora across continental Asia. Each tells a rich story that is familiar to us, but not particularly known in the broader community: the flowering of Iragi Jewry, its long influence bringing Jewish life to faraway China, and its cultural artifacts following the Shanghainese diaspora across the Pacific to Los Angeles. But to have them together is a much rarer privilege, one which I would never have imagined possible when the manuscript first crossed my desk a year ago. Ma rabu ma'asekha Adonai - how great are Your works, O Lord!

You never know when the time to "not ignore" may come. As I share the photo on the next page, I am eternally grateful to the partners whose attention to detail helped me notice these items, and the many more whose contributions made it possible for Kahal Joseph to become their loving custodian.


