## Rabbi's Message

Samuel Pepys was an English naval official who lived from 1633-1703. In his own day, he was famous for being the Chief Secretary of the British Admiralty, a position of international importance. But after his world faded into history, he became better known for a diary that he kept as a young man, in which he was an eyewitness to great people and events of the seventeenth century.

The Jews owe him a debt too, for in October 1663, he paid a visit to the Sephardic synagogue in London and wrote about his experience for posterity. Over three and a half centuries later, we can now enjoy the following little gem, which contains a glimpse of Sephardic life from a bygone age:

"After dinner my wife and I, by Mr. Rawlinson's conduct, to the Jewish Synagogue: where the men and boys in their vayles, and the women behind a lettice out of sight; and some things stand up, which I believe is their Law, in a press to which all coming in do bow; and at the putting on their vayles do say something, to which others that hear the Priest do cry Amen, and the party do kiss his vavle. Their service in all a signing way, and in Hebrew. And anon their Laws that they take out of the press are carried by several men, four or five several burthens in all, and they do relieve one another; and whether it is that every one desires to have the carrying of it, I cannot tell, thus they carried it round about the room while such a service is singing. And in the end they had a prayer for the King, which they pronounced his name in Portugall; but the prayer, like the rest, in Hebrew."

This sounds like a beautiful scene that many of us would recognize today. The "vayles" are talletot, the "lettice" is the mehitsa, and the classic Hebrew service and high honor bestowed on the Sifre Torah would seemingly do credit to the decorum of our prayers even at that early date...



Yet Pepys was apparently unaware that his visit was to take place on Simhat Torah, and the passage above concludes with a profound sense of shock at seeing these rare moments of letting loose without any background explanation:

"But, Lord! to see the disorder, laughing, sporting, and no attention, but confusion in all their service, more like brutes than people know the true God, would make a man forswear ever seeing them more; and indeed I never did see so much or could have imagined there had been any religion in the whole world so absurdly performed as this."

It is perhaps a little much to expect Pepys to be so far ahead of his time as to give us the benefit of the doubt. Yet his extreme reaction does beg the question: what kind of rejoicing should we be having?

The broader Jewish community has many different examples of celebration on Simhat Torah, which extend from simple, open-hearted joy at completing the Torah to dangerous extremes of excess. As we celebrate this year, let our model of sincere celebration be something that we would be proud for any visitor to witness and write about for future generations!
