Rabbi's Message

Amid a shower of sparks and the roar of exploding gunpowder, twin cords of flame began rising up the night sky, runged at regular intervals. It was a breathless summer evening last June, and Chinese pyrotechnical artist Cai Guo Qiang was fulfilling a decades-long dream as he treated Quanzhou to his memorable "Sky Ladder" display. An homage to the grandmother who believed in his career choice in spite of the risks, the massive 18-foot wide aluminum ladder carved a blazing arc over 1600 feet into the heavens.

The YouTube video is as remarkable for its imagery as for its sound, which could be heard crackling all around Meizhou Bay as the display topped a quarter mile in height. The huge burning ladder leaves a powerful impression, strong enough that congregants were showing it to me in honor of Parashat Vayetse over 18 months after it first graced the Eastern firmament.

How, then, did a similar sight affect our forefather Jacob as he dreamt of it at Bet EI? Witnessing a physical connection between the secular and spiritual worlds is no everyday occurrence, and it must have been a cathartic moment at a vulnerable point in Jacob's life. Yet behind this "local" instance of covenant for one individual, Our Sages have detected an even greater world of inspiration that resonates for the entire Jewish people.

Shimon Bar Kapara, of Pitum Haketoret fame, is among the first to unpack Jacob's vision (Midrash Rabba, Vayetse Ch. 68). Declaring that "no dream is without an interpretation," he compares the precise wording of Gen. 28:12-15 to similar language in other verses of the Torah, and con-

cludes that the ladder foretells the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. "Behold, a ladder" symbolizes the Stairway of Ascent, while "set upon the earth" reflects the earthen quality of the Altar (Ex. 20:21). "The top reached the heavens" is like the sacrifices, whose odor reached the heavens, and "the angels of God ascending and descending" parallel the movements of the Kohanim and Levi'im, whose holy watches

inspire "the Lord [to] stand beside him" as in Amos 9:1.

Using a similar methodology, the anonymous "Rabbanan" contend that the ladder represents the revelation at Sinai. In this rendering, "set upon the earth" reflects the Israelites standing at the foot of the Mount, whose fiery top "reached the heavens" just like the ladder (Deut. 4:2). "Ascending and descending" is thus the personal journey of Moses (Ex. 19:3, 14), whose highest climb put him almost directly "beside" the Divine Presence (Ex. 19:20).

While these competing answers could hardly be more different, they share a common thread of consciousness of future strength. When Jacob is feeling the most exposed, it is not just that God responds to his personal situation, but He does so in a way that foretells a glorious future that the Jews will still be talking about thousands of years later. Reading this, Jews who have tasted some of the painful reverses of post-Temple exile can also draw on this imagery for comfort and consolation. Just as our forefather's personal privation was answered with national triumph, so too may our own local tribulations foretell a better world for our entire people!
