### Rabbi's Message

In this week's episode of Agents of S. H. I. E. L. D., a running theme between two villains is an argument over the importance of tradition and the past.

The voice of "the old ways" comes from Anton Ivanov, head of a terrorist group called The Watchdogs. When we first meet him, he drinks a shot of vodka and breathes from a freshly cut onion, explaining that this is a time-honored Russian way to enhance the flavor of the drink. Gossiping with his victim, he takes a moment to regret the loss of custom in today's society. "What kind of world are we living in," he asks, "when distillers flavor their vodka with vanilla?!"

On the side of modernity is Dr. Holden Radcliffe, a mad scientist who has been both a friend and an enemy throughout the series. His passion is cutting-edge research on the mind, which he uses to design sophisticated robots. These lifelike humanoids are so convincing that he can succeed as an anti-hero without hurting people. Instead of resorting to violence, he gets what he wants with manipulation and deceit.

As their conversation unfolds, they keep coming back to the phrase "built to last." For Ivanov, past generations' attention to detail and workmanship allowed him to pursue his goals as a villain (or a visionary, as he sees it). While modern technology could break or be hacked, nothing beats good, old-fashioned muscle and cold, hard steel. Radcliffe, on the other hand, sees

the mind as a tool for improving on older accomplishments. Why settle for something mediocre if the next best thing is just around the corner?

Though they are both unsavory characters in a fictional TV show, this argument brings out some of the most relevant questions that the real Jewish community faces today: how dominating a role should the past play in our present?

So much of what makes our spiritual lives meaningful is our sense of connection to events that took place long ago. Our worship, our customs, and the way we treat our fellow humans are constantly shaped by the Torah and the thousands of years of traditions that developed around it. Yet few Jews take that to the extreme of living entirely in the past, and the communities that do have succeeded at a heavy price.

If our Judaism is going to be "built to last" in a society where most of us embrace modernity, it would best be served by the mad scientist's model of building on what came before to enrich our world today. Certainly there is a spiritual richness that comes from the chain of continuity between us and God's revelation – we value that and constantly draw inspiration from it. But the true power of this chain is that it is always growing: each generation adds their own link as they rise to a new set of challenges.

Parashat Bo is the climax of our miraculous Exodus from Egypt. God commands us to remember it every day, and this mantra opens us up for tradition to influence our actions. Yet we must not forget that these actions most meaningful in the world before us now: the Torah is our inheritance, and it teaches us how to live in 2017.

# Special Iraqi Haftarot for Parashiyot Shemot and Bo

On Parashiyot Shemot and Bo each year, Iraqi Jews read a Haftara that is different from the custom of most of the rest of the Jewish community.



These Haftarot are known so little that they are not even mentioned in most Humashim, including the ones we have at Kahal Joseph. Our custom of passing them out on special sheets has been a tradition of Babylonian Jewry for more than 100 years.

When Rabbi Melhado was making the current sheets, he used an old pamphlet from Baghdad that was left to Kahal by the family of **Abe Abraham**. We are pleased to make this text available for download, along with another Haftara pamphlet from his estate:
