Rabbi's Message

It may sound irreverent, but the movie *Blazing Saddles* gets me thinking about the 13 Attributes of God. If you are surprised by this comparison, you would not be the first. While the Attributes are a serious explanation from God



Himself about His merciful nature, *Blazing Saddles* is a sassy, profane comedy that pokes fun at traditional American racism. What could these possibly have in common?

To explain myself, I will highlight the last of the 13 Attributes, which seems harsh in comparison to the rest. If God is so compassionate and ready to forgive, why does He end by saying that He "will by no means clear the guilty, visiting the sins of the fathers onto the children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren"? (Ex. 34:7)

In *Blazing Saddles*, this is very much the experience of Sheriff Bart, the only African American in a town populated entirely by white people. His only "sin" is being black, something that he had no role in choosing for himself. If there is even anything transgressive about his skin color, the "fault" must lie with his ancestors, who passed it along to him without his consent.

Yet for this sin of blackness, he is shunned all over Rock Ridge. As he tries to assume the responsibility for protecting the town, doors of welcome or assistance are slammed in his face, and he is referred to by nasty racial slurs with a casualness that was shocking even when the film came out 43 years ago.

This is what "visiting the sins of the fathers on the children" looks like, so are we to understand that the town of Rock Ridge was following the example of God?! This is consistent with His other Attributes like fairness, mercy, and a level head?!

That problem is acknowledged by Rashi (1040-1105), who admits that the literal reading of this Attribute makes God appear stern and unfair. But instead of giving up hope in a just God, he reminds us that Jews do not always interpret every verse in the Torah literally, and points us to a beautiful explanation from the Tosefta.

In English, the 13th Attribute says that God "will by no means" forgive sin, but the Hebrew structure is simply a double verb and a single negative: "nake lo yenake." According to the Rabbis, this should be read that God "will **both** forgive **and** not forgive," depending on the merits of the situation (Tosefta Yoma 4:10).

In the Tosefta's portrayal of God, those who are eager to repent and try to resolve the problems they create will be accepted with the love and compassion of His other Attributes. It is only when a person is too proud and insensitive to repent that later generations will be affected. Since they will have created a harsh world, their children and grandchildren may inherit that harshness, having to work themselves to repair the damage that their parents and grandparents left behind.

This "ultimate fairness" is both a comfort and a call to action. It is a comfort because it means that God is eagerly waiting to help us restore justice. And It is a call to action because He wants us put our own skin in the game to make it happen. He is ready to assist – so what will we do to show that we want His help?
