Rabbi's Message

The big day is finally here! Months of careful planning ensured that everything would go right. The project's setbacks were recovered without losing momentum. The

final installation was completed according to design, and the deadline of the first of Nisan was met. After much heartache and selfsacrifice, the Holy Tabernacle has arrived!

But what is it for? How do we use it? What makes it worth the effort?

As we ended Sefer Shemot last week, we didn't have very much to go on to answer these questions. It is only now, once we have the Tabernacle in place, that God explains the full procedure for the sacrificial cult. The description of the sacrifices, their first ceremonies, and some priestly troubleshooting take up the first two and a half parashiyot of Vayikra between them, fully ten times the space devoted to this topic in Shemot (ch. 29). By backloading the instruction manual for the Mishkan in this way, God encourages us to take a deeper look at why He commanded us to have it in the first place.

The two times He mentions this come before the ideal depiction of the Tabernacle is spoiled with the sin of the Golden Calf. In both cases, God frames the Mishkan as a way to affirm our close relationship with Him. *"Build for Me a Sanctuary that I may dwell in it" – "and I will dwell among the Israelites and be their God"* (Ex. 25:8, 29:45). We know from our own lives that it

is possible to feel close to God without a Mishkan, yet what He is offering is to enjoy a public display of His approval. We can always show our faith through organized worship and good works, but to have a divine endorsement of that loyalty before the eyes of world is a type of approval we might never have dared possible.

The flip side of this modest sense of purpose is that it is very easy to let God's attentions go to our heads. "Look everyone! We are the Chosen People! We are the Light Unto the Nations! See how special we are! Come and bask in our radiance! Me, me, me!" The step from divine confirmation to smug superiority is fairly small, opening the pure intention of the Mishkan to misuse for human glorification.

That is why God harps on a seemingly minor point in the sacrificial cult, banning the use of *hamets* or honey for meal-offerings (Lev. 2:11). The Midrash Lekah Tob notices that both of these foods share the property of becoming "puffed up" when cooked – the bread rises as dough and in the oven, and the honey bubbles. In each case they are symbols of arrogance, of filling ourselves up with hot air when there is no substance behind it.

By only using "humble" foods at the altar, we are reminded to keep our feet planted on the ground. The Mishkan is an awesome display of decorum, but it must be focused on God to be effective. If our supposed piety is only about ourselves, what have we achieved?
