Rabbi's Message

This week the parasha is named for the ladies. The opening line – "isha ki tazria" – introduces a chapter of special regulations for women at childbirth, and it all starts with the word "woman."



In honor of this, I read the commentary on Tazri'a-Metsora by a brilliant female *parshanit*, Dr. Nechama Leibowitz (1905-1997), intending to share from her Torah in my Rabbi's message. It was only after deciding this and beginning to write the column that I learned she passed away on Shabbat Tazri'a. I was astonished that my casual impulse to celebrate her teachings would fall on her 20th anniversary!

The first section of Dr. Leibowitz's commentary explores what she terms "Biblical diseases." A disorder called "tsara'at" is the focus of most of Tazri'a and the beginning of Metsora, and indeed the word "metsora" is the name for a person suffering from this illness. But what exactly is it? Are we talking about a medical condition for which the Torah is prescribing treatment? Or perhaps it is a spiritual disease for which a doctor's cure would not be effective?

The symptoms described in the Torah (Lev.13-14) are open to both interpretations. *Tsara'at* is first presented as a skin condition that could be noticed through surface discoloration or scabbing. The appearance of the disease would change over time, requiring an expert witness to correctly diagnose it. All of this could support the theory that *tsara'at* is a biological sickness, which explains why the word is often translated as "leprosy" in

English. The great Don Isaac Abrabanel clearly adopted this thinking when he celebrated the Torah's wisdom in fighting contagious plagues.

However, there are aspects of *tsara'at* that don't entirely fit this mold. Unlike leprosy, which is spread through a bacterial infection and only manifests in the body, *tsara'at* can be just as visible on clothing or even the walls of our houses. Moreover, the expert witness who diagnoses it is not a doctor with medical credentials, but a Kohen, whose authority derives from spiritual forces. That is why the Rambam argues that *tsara'at* is a spiritual corrective against *lashon hara* – the sin of using words to undermine someone's reputation.

Dr. Leibowitz cites a convincing section from the Yad Hazaka in favor of this view: Among the early sufferers of *tsara'at* is Miriam, who is stricken after she and Aaron speak harshly against Moses. Once she gets the disease, it shocks both of them into realizing that they humiliated their brother and implicitly insulted God for choosing him. As soon as they make amends, the disease is miraculously removed (Num. 12 and Rambam Tum'at Tsara'at 16:10).

For Rambam, this is a warning against the danger of idle talk, which not only harms our fellows but also our Creator and the reputation of the Torah that He gave us. How convenient it might have been for *tsara'at* to be around in modern times! Its miraculous nature and stunning visuals would be a true rallying cry for mending our ways and doing our best for the people around us. With the disease no longer in play, it is now up to us to nurture the maturity and growth to be able to recognize these problems on our own.
