### Rabbi's Message

I admit it! The last time that I pulled an all-nighter for Torah study on Shabuot was seven years ago.

In my younger days, there was a

thrill to the idea of pushing my tendencies to be a "night person" to the extreme. Probably the best memories I have of Tikkun Lel Shabuot were during my time in Chicago in the late 2000s, when five area synagogues and their rabbis would host a joint program of nightlong study. We would learn Torah from dinner through sunrise with only short breaks, and there were so many topics that we still felt like we hadn't covered everything. After an early Shaharit it was back to a friend's house for delicious omelets, and finally we would crawl into bed around 10 am, shattered from 27 action-packed hours awake.

While this made for wonderful memories, it was hard on my constitution, which took the rest of the holiday and more to reset. Eventually I had to admit that it would be best for me to get my beauty sleep in the name of having a better global Shabuot experience. I love the Torah, and I make sure to study it later on Shabuot than I normally would. Yet for the sake of my body and my ability to spend Yom Tob with my kids. I have accepted that the custom of Tikkun after midnight will be preserved by other people than myself.

Many friends and congregants tell me that they are surprised by this. "You're a rabbi! How could you, of all people, go to bed?!" I understand that point of view, but if we look into the

history of the Tikkun, we will see that all-night learning on Shabuot is a relative latecomer to the Jewish communal scene:

The classical texts of Judaism, from the Tanakh

to the Sifre Yesod, do not mention the Tikkun in

# any way, and as late as the Abudarham (14th

century Spain), rabbinic scholars seemed totally unaware of it! Rabbi Joseph Caro, the author of the Shulhan Arukh, would apparently stay up on Shabuot, but that didn't stop him from completely omitting this tradition from his famous code of law. It was only in the late 16th century that the Kabbalists spread it across the Middle East and Europe, and the first book of Tikkun liturgy wasn't published until after the advent of modern coffee consumption. In the three and a half centuries since then, the Tikkun has transformed itself from a book of fixed readings to the open-ended limmud that we recognize today, giving the tradition yet another new face. This need not stop anyone from following a custom that is fun and brings people together in the service of God. There is power to the Midrashic image of Israelites sleeping away the night before the Torah was given, and God and Moses thundering at them to wake up (Shir Hashirim Rabba 1:12:2). If the Zohar's advice to fix this (3:98a) would move anyone to study the Torah all night in reparation, so much the better! And in the meanwhile, those of us who need an earlier stopping point will rest assured that we are following a legitimate minhag as well. May we continue to enjoy a free society where our biggest problem on Shabuot is when to conclude our religious studies!

#### The Travails of Jewish Basra

The association of Shavuot with the 1941 riots in Baghdad known as "Farhud" makes the first week of Sivan an opportunity to commemorate our persecution. Last year we observed the 75th anniversary of the Farhud, so this year we turn to Basra.

In the summer of 1948, Israel's independence brought the loyalty of the entire Iraqi Jewish community into question. Sir Henry Mack, British Ambassador to Iraq, summed up the situation on July 14th (redacted for length):

"There is a growing tendency to undertake a 'witch hunt' against Iraqi Jews and use military courts to make money or pay off old scores. Some of them were sentenced on the flimsiest of pretexts and the conduct of some trials was certainly most unfair to the defendants. In one case a man was arrested at 1 p.m. on one day and sentenced to a year's hard labour at 10 a.m. the next day."

By September, the situation boiled over with the surprise arrest of community president Shafiq Ades. His abrupt execution turned Basra into a center of clandestine emigration that continued until the border was opened. May the memories and scarifies of Jewish Basrawis be honored through our rekindled Iraqi Jewish life in Los Angeles. Tikkun Lel Shavuot
