## Rabbi's Message

This week's white supremacist rally in Charlottesville has come with striking images and video clips, several of which depict angry, torch -wielding men chanting "Jews will not replace us." If they didn't have our attention before, we are certainly listening now.



The argument against this worldview is so straightforward that it shouldn't be necessary to repeat it in 2017, but here we go: we are better off if our default view of our neighbors is to see them as fellow humans whose mere existence is not a threat. We have so much more energy available when the advancement of our tribal interests does not depend on the degradation of another group. We are so spiritually nourished when we spend that energy on constructive, positive goals. Baseless hatred should have little to offer when it deprives us of these fulfillments. This is a universal logic that should hold true for anyone.

Perhaps that is exactly why we feel so violated to hear anti-Semitism and other forms of racial hatred expressed so nakedly in the public square. It replaces our innate positivity with fear, taints our emotional and spiritual lives with negativity, and can inflict nasty, personal costs on its victims.

The desire to nip this sort of behavior in the bud before it spirals out of control is completely normal, even laudatory. The weak and vulnerable must be protected, and the Jewish community is a living witness to what happens when unchecked bigotry reaches its outer limits. Standing up for what's right is both virtuous and selfless, so who wouldn't want to rise to the challenge?

Yet having said all this, I find myself so disappointed by a certain subset of "just" responses to the rally. Perhaps the best example is a photo of a man still holding the Nazi salute as a counter demonstrator sucker-punches him in the jaw. Beneath the image is a smarmy caption reading:

This is \*NOT\* okay. This sets a dangerous example, and we need to talk about it. If you punch a Nazi like this, you're going to break your wrist. Remember, make contact with the two largest knuckles (index and middle finger) and keep a strong wrist. You want to hurt the Nazi, not yourself! Stay safe and keep punching Nazis.

While I can appreciate the poetic justice, and even the humor, of this meme, I cannot endorse its message. Many types of hate speech are legal in the US unless the words are "directed to inciting imminent lawless action" (Brandenburg v. Ohio, 1969). This policy actually protects the Jews, whose own views could otherwise be outlawed. Giving a Nazi salute may be morally despicable, but it passes the imminent danger test. If our best response to being affronted is to punch people in the face, then we also have a thing or two to learn about how to be decent.

Carrying on as others express views that upend everything we hold dear is one of the hardest trials that we face. It is a lifetime project to even be able to listen to them, let alone to develop sophisticated, effective ways of responding. If this week's events call upon us to act, it is a call to harness these skills and make a strong, inspiring demonstration of what a better worldview looks like.

Kahal Joseph welcomes you to the special selihot prayers before Shaharit over the next five weeks.

These unique services begin the process of spiritual cleansing in the lead-up to Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur. We come early to synagogue in the morning twilight, at the time when the Talmud says that God is most inclined to be merciful, and pour out our hearts before Him. *Hatanu lefanekha, rahem alenu* - "we have sinned before You, have mercy upon us!"

Sephardi tradition calls for rousing melodies that are sung with the full devotion of our hearts. Poetic favorites like *Anenu*, *Im Afes*, and *Avinu Malkenu* are interspersed with supplications and the 13 Attributes of God, making a diverse palate of prayers that puts us in the best frame of mind for repentance.

Make this a great start to your day any morning from Rosh Hodesh Elul until Yom Kippur.
