Community Message

Every one of us has the capacity to be a walking model of loving kindness on certain occasions. Sometimes simply being willing to witness suffering, sorrow or despair is enough. Visiting and offering a cup of tea. Bringing by groceries or a prescription. Sitting in discomfort, forsaking easy answers. Sharing life's unwanted moments.

Indirectly, our Torah portion for the week alludes to just this: the need for every member of society to be responsible and to act. Taken as a whole, Ki Tetse is a perplexing, paradoxical collection of mitzvot. However, looked at verse by verse, it is not difficult to understand. Numerous lines contain lessons in how to nurture freedom and protect all beings. Leave eggs in a nest if the mother bird is near. Treat captive women with respect. Help suffering animals. Give refuge to escaped slaves. Watch over and return what has been lost.

Even in sections that challenge modern values, the parasha emphasizes moral action, highlighting each person's capacity for choice and the imperative of choosing with conscience. Relationships are sacred. Trust is essential. Honorable behavior is paramount. Repeatedly and unflinchingly, Ki Tetse confronts moral questions and presents ethical challenges, addressing situations that jeopardize a peaceful, just and secure society. Such circumstances prod each of us to consider: how should we care for our family, our home, our walled city, our cultivated field, ourselves?

Yet, true to form, the Torah does not advocate either infinite generosity or unlimited responsibility. Looked at from a slightly different angle, Ki Tetse

is about interpersonal boundaries, about how to protect them and, occasionally, about when to relax them. One seemingly esoteric mitzva may explain the general idea. It is the requirement to build a fence on our roof to prevent accidental falls.

Looked at metaphorically, this mitzva suggests that we are responsible for protecting others and for guiding their behavior even when we are not around. At the same time, it suggests that we can only be accountable for our own actions, and not for others'--for our roof and not for our neighbors'. We need to remember where the limit of our ability lies and not overextend ourselves.

Through this vivid image, Ki Tetse reminds us to keep the balance, to ensure that too much is not asked of a single person. Communal tending must be a task shouldered by more than a few committed individuals. For instance, we should each look after our shared Jewish life and look beyond the rabbi, the Board members, the synagogue staff, or the stalwart volunteers who do it for us. Similarly, preserving the common good is in more hands than those of idealistic teachers, diligent engineers, dedicated doctors and conscientious public servants. And altruism is something we might all aspire towards, just like the handful of exemplary souls we admire--the devoted friends, the reliable family members.

A unique individual whom we recently lost, Anita Wozniak, z"l, was a woman who clearly considered such questions and strove to act in accordance with these ideals. One of the greatest gifts we can offer in her memory and in the memory of those whom we have cherished is to look after one another as they would have wanted. Because caring for our community is a responsibility we share. It is a mitzva that requires us all.



Ezra Levi Torah Rededication

With profound happiness, we welcome back the Ezra Levi Sefer Torah to Kahal Joseph after a full restoration by our sofer (ritual scribe).

Ezra Kelly Levi was born in Aleppo, Syria on July 8, 1892. He moved to Calcutta, India and became a shopkeeper, owning a gramophone store and two pastry shops. He had two children from his first marriage, Sarah & Aziza, and nine children with wife Matilda. He died on June 6, 1954 in London, England.

By family tradition, his son Saul Levi wanted to honor his memory with a Sefer Torah at his home congregation, Kahal Joseph. Saul designed the Torah casing, and with the help of his friend Ike Abraham, had it made in India. He acquired the parchment in Israel, and the two were united in the US in the 1960s. Twenty years later, he was inspired to include this iconic Torah in the Kahal stained glass, pictured to the left. The window is called "Jerusalem" and was dedicated to the memory of his son, Errol Levi.

Restoring a Torah scroll to its former glory is always a moment of celebration, and that is particularly true for this sefer, with its long history with Kahal. We are excited to have many members of the extended Levi family in attendance, including the Kurtzes and the Einys. The festivities commence with Simhu Na (words on page 5), and at Saul's aliya Rabbi Melhado will sing Tenu Shebaha, a traditional Portuguese Jewish prayer for the Hatan Torah.
