

Rabbi's Message Israel Edition – Yaakob and the Sephardim


Returning to Kena'an must have been emotional for Yaakob. He was born there, and lived a full life there before his exile to Padan Aram. Along with a vivid body of



As a flood of recollections bubbled up in his mind, he could appreciate how much he had developed during his absence. He left his birth-place with neither family nor assets, and was now returning as a wealthy dignitary with four wives and thirteen children. Assuming he could make peace with Esav, he would become an instant person of note in Canaanite society.

Yet more vital than any private gain was the spiritual poetry of resettling the land that God had promised his ancestors. God said that He would be with Yaakob if he were to take this path, and now that he has embarked on it, he is pulsing with excitement. After wrestling with an angel on the cusp of making this dream a reality, he crosses the Jordan with a new covenantal title: Yisrael, "he who has striven with God and man and prevailed." Little did he know that the entire country would one day bear this evocative name!

As I imagine Yaakob's psychological state during this moment, I cannot help but think that his



Such a life is personified in another Yaakob, Rabbi Yaakob Berab (1474-1546). Born into a Castillian family that had flourished in Sepharad, his expulsion launched a long homeward journey across North Africa and back to Ottoman Safed. Maturing as a Jewish public figure along the way, he hatched a bold plan to reintroduce rabbinic ordination to world Jewry. Though his dream was not fully realized, one of his ordainees, Rabbi Joseph Caro, went on to author the Shulhan Arukh, the most influential force in standardizing Jewish law until this very day.

Like the Biblical Yaakob, Rabbi Berab came to Israel as a noted refugee who was trying to restore the spiritual institutions of Judaism. His sojourn in a foreign country may have paled in comparison to his later achievements in the Holy Land, but it furnished him with the tools he needed to survive and thrive there. Writing this in the Diaspora, I hope that we too may follow the lead of these two Yaakobs. Their example is a perpetual challenge to use our successes here for the benefit of our people and our homeland.


