

Rabbi's Message

On the first night of Hanukkah, a friend of mine posted a picture of Bibi Netanyahu in an interfaith forum for Jews, Christians, and Muslims. In the image, the Israeli Prime Minister is lighting the Hanukkah in a charming photo op, his wife Sarah looking on approvingly at his side.



Regrettably, the inspiration I felt from this shot was cut short by the discussion that it produced. The very first comment was an attack on Mr. Netanyahu's apparent ignorance of the laws of lighting the Hanukkah. "What is the third candle for?!" the contributor asked, scornfully pronouncing this "incorrect." My friend tried to laugh it off by joking that the Prime Minister had gotten his instructions from Reform Jews. I assume he meant well, but it came out clumsily and invited an icy back-and-forth about the relative merits of Reform and Orthodoxy.

The intensity of these arguments warrants a closer look at both the local issue and the broader points that it brings up. In the photo, the branches of Mr. Netanyahu's Hanukkah are clearly manufactured for a wider candle than he was using. Probably the candles had to be melted in place to stay erect, making both the first night's candle and the Shamash immobile. A third flame would thus be needed to light the other two, and hence the scene depicted in the image.



As it happens, this is a completely permitted way to light the Hanukkah! Contrary to popular belief, the "Shamash" exists to provide an extra source of light, not an extra source of flame. The Talmud says that we must devote the light of the Hanukkah exclusively to proclaiming the miracle of the oil to the world. If we used it for mundane purposes, we would be diluting the message, so we put a non-sacred light next to the Hanukkah lights to remind us of this (Shabbat 21b, and SA OH 671:5). A Google Images search for "Netanyahu Hanukkah" shows many pictures of him lighting a fixed Shamash with an additional candle, including one where an Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi is looking right at him without interfering.

While this completely vindicates Mr. Netanyahu, there is still the greater question of how to respond to Jews doing something that we view as "different" or even "wrong" in the name of Judaism. I accept that it calls for a great deal of maturity to coexist with people whose practice of Judaism opposes our own value system. It is as challenging for Orthodox Jews to tolerate free-thinking approaches to Jewish law as it is for Liberal Jews to accept an Orthodoxy that considers their entire way of life illegitimate. To put aside our understandable feelings of anger and betrayal and think of such people as being "on the same team" is asking a lot.

Still, it is good for us to push ourselves to do this, and to grapple with our own insecurities and limitations. The attacks of the Syrian Greeks in the Hanukkah story were born out of their inability to live in a world with people different from themselves. To truly appreciate the victory of Hanukkah, we must demonstrate with our actions that we can rise to a higher standard.


