Rabbi's Message

Tuesday's water district vote was a striking example of how tough it can be to pull off a project in which large numbers of people must cooperate.



At issue is Governor Jerry Brown's dream of boring two massive tunnels from the Sacramento San Joaquin river delta to the Southland. Wide enough to park a turbo jet inside, each enormous structure would cost \$8.5 billion to build, and would run longer than the tunnel that connects England to France.

More than a decade has passed since this idea was first proposed in California, but it continues to face challenges at every turn. The physical tunnels don't even exist, but there are already lawsuits against their impact on the environment and on local water collection efforts. Meanwhile, a major shake-up has occurred about who will foot the bill. Cautious planners have been pushing to confirm all the investors before starting, but a more confident group is willing to risk completing the project at a deficit and recouping the losses later.

Tuesday's vote apparently gave this latter camp the upper hand, but the only reliable outcome at the moment is that progress has stalled again. As long as the uncertainty persists the project may never commence, making us more interested in stories about people trying to stop it than in ones about trying to get it moving.

Whenever I read of such predictable disorder, I renew my amazement at the relatively smooth completion of the Holy Tabernacle. Several whole parashiyot contain nothing but dense construction plans for it, yet somehow the Israelites find a way to pull it off without even having a picture to consult! Logistical infighting of the type affecting the tunnel project seems to be a minor concern next to idolatry, which is basically the only hiccup. By the time we hit the opening parashiyot of Vayikra, an unprecedented building is standing and ready for use, a thumping feat of teamwork by any standards.

What is the root of the Israelites' success? I think it lies in the attitude of Parashat Bahar, when God clearly indicates that everyone with something creative to bring to the table is welcome (Ex. 35:10). Both men and women give openly of their time and resources, so willingly in fact that Moshe and Aharon have to stop them because there is too much (36:5-7). Hence, any conflict is less about how to implement the vision, and more about managing an abundance of willing hands.

Halavai that we could all live up to this worthy example! The work of maintaining a cherished project or vision is tough, and in a synagogue it is all the more vital. Betsalel and Aholiab are so effective because they receive the people's goodwill translated into action. It is really the strength of the people that undergirds the project's success. The leaders' power derives from a preexisting culture among the nation, a culture that followed words with commitment. It was this that allowed Betsalel and Aholiab to help the Israelites implement their dreams and bring the Mishkan to fruition. If they did it, so can we!
