Rabbi's Message

The popular image of the leper is about as bad as can be. To grotesque visual effect, our imaginations have conflated the Torah's depiction of a spiritual skin illness with an actual medical condition



known as Hansen's disease. A quick online search for "leprosy" reveals everything from classic art and media representations to photos of real Hansen's patients. These images mostly read as negative, bearing out the Biblical cry of "unclean, unclean" that the affected parties must cry (Lev. 13:44-46).

Even when we emphasize the distinction between *Tsara'at* and Hansen's, the pejorative connotation remains. As presented in the Torah, *Tsara'at* is a physical manifestation of spiritual degeneration, designed to shock the patient into renouncing their problematic lifestyles and returning to God. As a medical condition, Hansen's is a chronic disease that is physically disfiguring and can even cause the total loss of extremities. With either one, it is hard for us to stop the recoil response and instead display feelings of human compassion.

Against this canvas of bad feeling, the Haftara for Parashat Metsora is an important corrective. The action opens as four lepers sit starving at the gates of a besieged city in Samaria. Desperate for food, they defect to the camp of their Aramaean enemies, where they are astonished to discover that it has been abandoned. They gorge themselves on provisions and valuables, but then they remember their sense of civic responsibility. The Israelites must be told of this important military intelligence, and it would be

selfish of them to keep the benefit for themselves. Surmounting the townspeople's prejudices and suspicions, they communicate the news to the King, bringing significant economic relief and the end of the siege. From their humble, even humiliating beginnings, they end the story as heroes.

This Haftara's moral imperative reminded me of a day in New York City when I came up to a train station and realized that there was no elevator for Penny's stroller. As I ruefully contemplated the two full flights of stairs that lay ahead. the angry looking, heavily tattooed young man next to me cracked a big smile and helped me up the steps without even being asked. He had kids of his own, he explained, and he knew how tough it could be. If I had passed him on the street, he might have read as a potential threat, but up close he was actually a nice person. This lesson was driven home all the more at the end of the trip. Shopping at a nearby grocery store, I enquired of a clean-cut man in business casual which line he was waiting in, and he cussed me out in front 20 flabbergasted customers and staff.

Stories like these burst through the social expediency of judging by appearances. It may indeed be true that reading surface cues helps us assess what is going on behind the scenes. That is why we show up to job interviews in our Shabbat clothes, or why we would mistrust a doctor whose medical offices are shabby. Yet at the same time, carrying this street-savvy to its logical extreme could lead us to become judgmental and harsh. We could get so caught up in the outward optics of a situation that we fail to recognize people's potential for goodness, or to imagine what the world is like from their perspective. If we expect people to look past our own shortcomings, let us make ready to lead by example.


