Rabbi's Message

The Six-Day War that began on the 26th of Iyar 51 years ago was an unexpected moment of triumph for the Jewish people. Our beloved new State of Israel had been living



a dangerous existence as a narrow country surrounded by openly hostile enemies. With conflict boiling just below the surface, the Israeli military pushed to stay several steps ahead, and it paid off. Striking first for the element of surprise, they scored a sweeping victory that trounced multiple opponents on the battlefield.

Not only did they beat back their enemies, but they also took possession of strategic territories that had once been used for attacks against us. This included areas such as Judea and Samaria, with major historical importance to our Biblical heritage, as well as the Old City of Jerusalem. People danced in the streets and wept at the sites of holy places that had been inaccessible for the past two decades. *Jerusalem was whole again!* These words have resounded in our ears like magic ever since.

The legacy of victory has had many lasting effects on policy and politics in our own time. Particularly when we are reading Behar-Behukotai, we are reminded that Zionism received a huge *spiritual* boost from the Six Day War. The return of Biblical Israel to the Jewish people in less than a week's time seemed to many like a true miracle from God, launching the "Dati Leumi," or Religious Zionist movement as never before. Unlike many previous forms of Zionism, which were secular in character, the Dati Leumi were concerned with applying the special halakhot of

the Land of Israel in the new territories. With ancient Israel now in Jewish hands, they pushed for serious public conversations about whether and how the unique laws of this week's parasha and others like it could be observed in modern times.

These discussions naturally included the city of Jerusalem, whose dramatic reunification was marred by the shock of cultural destruction that had happened in the Jewish quarter. With the reward-and-punishment narrative of Behukotai recently in mind, how were we to interpret the havoc that was wrought upon our institutions? When we saw the exploded ruins of our synagogues, along with even more wretched profanations, should we understand it as a consequence of our own bad faith? Or perhaps this new chance to rebuild Jerusalem for the modern era was a reward for our devotion to God?

As Sephardim, such questions were made all the more complicated by the wholesale ruin of our spiritual infrastructure in Jerusalem. All four of our synagogues and the Porat Yosef yeshiva (founded, inter alia, by an Iragi Jew from Calcutta) were reduced to rubble. While many of the edifices have since been rebuilt, the special creativity of Sephardic rabbinic culture has never recovered. A "jubilee" of sorts has passed since then without a lasting regeneration. As we usher in the next 50 years of united Jerusalem, let us ask what can unite us as observant Sephardim in the modern world. How can we draw from the inspiration of Yom Yerushalayim and the excitement of the Dati Leumi revival to make something meaningful for our children's benefit? What gift can we give the next generation of Sephardim that will make them look at today's moment as the time that miracles were made?

Recommended Reading on the Iraqi Jewish Diaspora

"Religious Music Traditions of the Jewish-Babylonian Diaspora in Bombay" by Sara Manasseh

Ethnomusicology Forum devoted their June 2004 edition to the musical outcomes of Jewish migration across Asia. The second article explores how songs from the Baghdadi Jewish community were transmitted over several generations in Bombay and its subdiaspora communities.

The article tracks six melodies that were brought to India by the immigrant generation. While they and later arrivals used classically Arab expressions of the baseline tunes, their Indian-born offspring brought subcontinental musical elements and pronunciations. These were observed over several decades by musicologists who transcribed or recorded performances by Jewish singers of Bombay. Using an analysis of the elements that were preserved, the author reflects on the values of the Bombay community. As a bonus, the introduction has a nice summary of the Iraqi Jewish presence in Maharashtra, with sources for further reading.


