Rabbi's Message

On Shabbat Nahamu in August 1675, crowds of people thronged by the canals of Amsterdam to see the latest urban wonder: a massive Sephardic synagogue that would



dominate the skyline for centuries. At a time when Dutch Catholics were still holding worship in private homes for fear of persecution, the nation's Sephardim had just erected the largest synagogue in the world. Feeling grateful for the privileges that enabled this achievement, it was no surprise that its creators would declare that "our new homeland is in Holland."

The weekend's festivities were extensively documented, and they reflect an intimacy with the host society that was unheard of in other countries. The mayor and almost the entire city council were present for the consecration, along with many other well-regarded Christian figures about town. Illustrator Romeyn de Hooghe's presence there lead many Sephardim to commission him for images that they could keep as souvenirs. He thus became one of several Dutch artists to depict the Esnoga (synagogue) inside or out, contributing to a shift in Amsterdam's civic culture that put a Jewish synagogue on a Calvinist city's list of must-see attractions.

Seven sermons preached by the community's rabbis and scholars during the celebration have been preserved. Many of them highlight the similarities between the new Esnoga and the Holy Temple, whose loss had just been mourned a few days before on Tisha Be'av. While an elegant modern synagogue could never replace the real thing, it served as a "mikdash me'at," or "model sanctuary" that became the new focus of Sephardic hearts. How better to rekindle a longing for Jerusalem than through the story of a people who rose from a debased minority to the world's finest monumental architects in just a few generations?

Nearly 300 years after its inaugural Shabbat, this synagogue would host another batch of recent expellees: the oppressed remnants of Iraq's Jewish community. Holland was once again a safe haven for Jews in need of a second chance, and the Esnoga was the first place they prayed after their arrival. Ask around in our services and you will see how personal this story is: several of our past and current board members were among the Iraqis who first tasted religious freedom within the Esnoga's sacred walls.

It is a very special building that has crept one year closer to its Sesquarcentennial. May it stand as a beacon of hope and liberty in the Diaspora for all eternity!
