Rabbi's Message

I don't typically find that stories in the "wellness" section of the newspaper draw me in. My top-heavy life tends to limit the time I have for any news, and subjects like disease and anxiety tend to increase the stress levels that the articles recommend reducing. While I often appreciate these sections when I am looking for this type of content, it works best when I am the seeker.

Hence I was pleasantly surprised when an unsolicited "wellness" article from a few years ago managed to engross me. Penned by Lindsay Holmes, a young new editor at the Huffington Post, it offered *11 Signs of A Genuine Friendship*. It was noteworthy not for its depth or originality, but for accessibly capturing some important points about what a true friend really is. I was also impressed that it came out only 9 days before Parashat Ki Tavo, for you will soon see the parallels.

The third aliya of Ki Tavo is about the "all's well" side of a relationship. It lays out an ideal world where God and the Israelites commit to each other. We express our love by living out His Torah and making the world a better place. He expresses His love by being our God and treasuring us. Everyone gives something, everyone gets something, and everyone does it with their full heart.

But jump ahead to the sixth aliya and there is a totally different story. After a brief positive vision



of the benefits of this covenant, we hear pages upon pages of threats and curses that will come about if we don't live up to our side of the bargain. It is so harsh that the Hazan takes the aliya to shield the congregants, and he reads it quickly and softly. How do we square this intense severity with God's self-portrayal as our loyal, patient mentor who yearns to accept our forgiveness?

I happily found a good answer in tip #2 of Ms. Holmes's *Genuine Friendship* article. Citing mood disorder specialist Robert Rowney, she notes that true friends "call us out when we're in the wrong. [They identify our flaws] in a mindful manner not to be spiteful, but for accountability's sake. They're able to point out some of the negative things you're doing in addition to the positive."

In other words, God gives us these passages as a form of *tokheha*, the duty of waking a friend up to the idea that they are approaching a moral crisis. Our experience shows that these curses do not always come true in the literal sense, allowing them to serve as a spiritual mirror in which we can perceive our worst potential. Once down the wrong path, it is really our own actions that will curse us, and God won't need to exert Himself much. But if we go back to Him in the spirit of the Haftarot of Consolation, we can be the coauthors of a much brighter future. If He is reaching out to say that He'll be the kind of friend in Ms. Holmes's article, I'll take it: keeping us humble, practicing forgiveness, and making us want to be better people.

2) **Please tell us of your need as soon as you arrive** – speak to Albert Nissan or David Kohan. Our Gabbaim will be avoiding Delugim, so asking early will make it more possible for you to get the mitsva.

3) **Please have the names ready** in your mind or on a piece of paper when you get your Aliya.

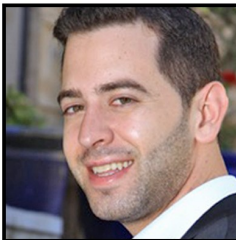
