

Rabbi's Message

Every year it warms my heart to see Lulavim and Etrogim around the neighborhood. Their classic look and smells evoke fond memories of Sukkots gone by, bringing a knowing smile to my lips. I can



Yet beyond God's commandment that we should use them to become happy, why did He pick these particular plants? The Torah is silent about this, leaving the Sages of the Talmudic period to suggest their own explanations. Each year I like to select a different one from Rabbinic literature and see if I can connect to it afresh. The one that spoke to me most recently appears in Vayikra Rabba 30:10:

- 'The fruit of the citron (hadar) tree' this symbolizes Sarah, whom God graced (hidder) with a ripe old age, as it is written 'Avraham and Sarah grew old' (Gen. 18:11).
- 'The branch of the date palm' this symbolizes Rivka. Just as a date palm produces food and has thorns, so too did Rivka bring up a righteous child and an evildoer.
- 'Boughs of myrtle trees' this symbolizes Leah. Just as the myrtle is studded with leaves, so too was Leah studded with children.

'Willows of the brook' –
this symbolizes Rahel. Just as the willow
withers before the other three species do, so
too did Rahel pass away before her sister.

Despite the tragedy of some of these comparisons, I enjoyed the image of the Lulav and Etrog as deriving from our Four Matriarchs. This is similar to the explanation of the number of matsot on Pesah: once we perform the step of Yahats, there are four pieces of Matsa at the seder table to remind us of these special women. Since they were the ones who brought the Tribes of Israel into being, it is fitting that they be represented throughout the Maggid section of the Seder (Keter Shem Tob, vol. III, p. 99).

Both holidays are rich in themes of birth and renewal. Each has a component of the creation of the Jewish nation: Pesah for our exodus from Egypt, and Sukkot for the booths where God housed us after we left there. Each also has a component of being a harvest festival, celebrating that Erets Yisrael produced a live-giving crop. These cycles of rebirth are best expressed through the symbol of our Mothers, who are essential to our own physical and spiritual continuity.

The day after Kippur, my family began to build the sukka that we squeeze onto our back porch. Even though they are very young, our girls were jumping with excitement to help put it together. How I will treasure the pictures that we took of them carrying the poles with their grandfather, who 30 years ago enjoyed the childish help of yours truly! I am sure that our Matriarchs would look with such pleasure on this freshest example of the renewal of the Jewish tradition!


