### Rabbi's Message

Between Rosh Hashana and Parashat Beresheet, I sometimes think about a scene from *Lord of the Rings*. In the third film, the kingdom of Gondor faces a battle and seeks help from their ally, Rohan. Given the technology



available, the best way to communicate between these lands is to light a massive beacon on the cliffs above their capital city. The flame can be seen from miles away, and when watchmen on the next peak observe it, they light a beacon too. In this manner the message reaches Rohan promptly, giving their troops just enough time to fulfill their duty.

I always smile to myself at this scene because it is taken straight out of the Mishna. In the early days of Rabbinic Judaism, our calendar was set by observing the new moon, which required formal validation from the court. At certain times, it was critical that the endorsed date of Rosh Hodesh be sent swiftly to Jews in the Diaspora, since celebrating our Festivals depended on this information. That was especially so at Rosh Hashana, which is why the following description appears in the laws of that holiday:

How were the flares lit? They would take long cedar-wood sticks [and flammables], which a court messenger tied together with rope, took to the top of the hill, and ignited. He waved it until he could see his fellow doing the same on top of the next hill, and so too on top of the third hill... The court's messengers did not go beyond Bet Baltin, but from there the flare was waved around until one could see all Babylonia before him like a sea of fire. – Rosh Hashana 2:3-4

This procedure is part of a concerted effort to fulfill a verse in Parashat Beresheet: "God said: 'Let there be lights in the firmament of the heaven to divide the day from the night; and they will be used for signs, for seasons, and for days and years" (Gen. 1:14). In other words, God is telling us that He predesigned the sun and moon for use as celestial calendars. Since He commands that certain mitsvot be fulfilled on specific dates, calculating them correctly is essential to fulfilling His Torah.

This issue is so important that it split the Jews between rival camps such as Rabbanites (us), Karaites, and Samaritans. Each group claimed to have the "real" understanding of the calendar, and thus the "correct" Jewish religion. As each sought to enforce their truths onto all Jewry, the Samaritans purposely lit fires on nights that skewed the Rabbanite calendar and confused the Jews of Babylonia. This "made it impossible for the Jews outside Palestine to keep the festivals on the appointed days," even with the replacement of fires with trusted messengers (Moses Gaster, The Samaritans, p. 37).

The best solution for Rabbanites has become known as the 'Second Festival Days of the Diaspora,' a set of double holiday observances that are the reason we have two seders and two "first days" of Sukkot. While this and other Talmudic ideologies helped consolidate our ranks, the Samaritans dwindled down to just a few hundred followers. This has done much to soften the rancor of the 'Second Festival Days,' which now feel much more like an extended celebration than the fight they once were. Indeed, as we observed them at Kahal last week, I could not help but thinking how grateful I am to the Talmud for giving us the enduring Judaism we have today.
