Rabbi's Message

I've been thinking a lot about materialism lately. Many western economies are capitalist, and run on people's desire to own things. Our professional and personal lives frequently



involve buying material objects, and our public and virtual spaces are full of advertisements from companies that sell them. We are constantly pursuing the next thing, and our homes become so full of things that we have to buy more things to organize the things we already have.

As a committed bibliophile I am a full participant in this culture of ownership. There is a certain thrill in finding the next book, and having ready access to the knowledge contained between its covers. While my goal is enriching my mind, it comes with the cumbersome physical demands of organizing and storing a personal library.

On my recent trip to the East Coast, a fellow airline passenger remarked at the hours I had spent reading a book, and wanted to know what had captured my attention so fully. I showed him that it was "Prince of the Press," a history of Hebrew print media that followed the library of Rabbi David Oppenheim, Chief Rabbi of Prague in the early 18thcentury. In the ensuing back-andforth, my new friend suddenly gave a hearty chuckle. "You mean you're a book collector who found out there was a book about a book collector and you collected it?!"

While that exchange was a witty sendup of my book-buying habit, this particular book offered valuable insight into the human impulse to own

objects containing information. Remarking on the rise of modern print libraries in the 17thcentury, Teplitsky points out that "an essential component of this process was access to the stuff of knowledge via the direct possession of those objects that bore such truths. 'Objectivity' as a scientific notion preserves the linguistic register of knowledge inhering in objects as a material, object-based experience" (pp. 7, 211 ff. 10).

I particularly appreciated this reflection on the week of Shabbat Shekalim, since this is how we remember the special reading for the Haftara. The average synagogue attendee may or may not have the halakha at their fingertips when it comes to selecting the right reading (SA OH 685). It's different in years when there is one Adar or two, and it can be hard to remember what trumps what when there is a single or double parasha and a special Shabbat. Instead we rely on the notations in the printed Humashim, and thus we have the perfect example of a physical object where possessing it dictates our communal practice. We might value this even more as Iragis, since our Haftarot sometimes do not appear in published Humashim, and we must reprint them from older pamphlets that were previously collected by bibliophiles and scholars.

Yet materialism surely has its limits, and the content of the readings of Shabbat Shekalim is an important corrective. Throughout all of our commercialism, we must save resources for the things that are truly valuable: the well-being of the poor, and the maintenance of institutions that nurture our moral lives and set us on the upright path. Even the Kohanim in the Haftara need to be reminded that our financial resources are only as meaningful as the benevolence with which we disburse them.


