Rabbi's Message

The concept of a "spiritual disease" lands oddly in our scientific society. Yet that is precisely how the *tsara'at* sickness is presented in the Torah. Symptoms bring the patient to a priest, not a doctor, and the plan of

care achieves *tahara* (spiritual purification) rather than *refu'a* (biological healing). Attempts to identify it with known human pathologies are defied by its appearance in clothing and buildings. According to the Midrash, *tsara'at* struck inanimate objects first to encourage a sinner's remorse, and only if that failed to inspire repentance would it enter their bodies (Vayikra Rabba 17:4).

The idea that a building could be spiritually diseased was brought home for me by an arresting series of photos published this week by an old family friend. Her father, Maurice Friedberg, was born in 1929 in Rzeszów Poland, in a building that his mother's parents had built to house their extended family. One of the photos in the series showed the whole structure, followed by a cute shot of five of them crowed onto a little balcony. Sadly, several of those pictured did not survive the Holocaust, perishing along with most of Rzeszów's large Jewish population. Absent the rest of the story, the building would appear as a *metsora*, an eerie remnant of senseless murder.

But the tale didn't end there because some of the family survived and carried on. Maurice – whom I loved dearly as a grandfatherly figure— was a fascinating, impossible man who became an accomplished scholar of Slavic languages and was never wrong. It takes a special combination of luck and assertive personality to come through the war and start anew. He lived a rich life that brought joy and good-natured exasperation

to everyone he knew. He had a joke for every occasion and was renowned in our family for convincing my brother to give him a treasured chocolate chip cookie at the tender age of one. The world was immeasurably richer for his place in it, and I thank God that I was able to have him in my life.

Fast forward to 2019, five years since his death, and there in my Facebook feed was the picture of the building where he was born. Yet alongside it was a new photo of his daughter Edna, who grew up to become a Holocaust historian, standing triumphantly on a balcony from the same building. Her caption read in part, "today I crawled out a window [to] recreate a photo of relatives who didn't survive the war."

Talking to Edna about her post, I learned that her father's family had successfully reclaimed and sold the building after the war. It is now mostly occupied by a psychiatric clinic, but a reluctant staff allowed her to climb onto the balcony one floor above the original photo to take the new one. This drew the attention of the clinic's director, who turned out to be one of the few Jews left in town. She raised a daughter who now lived in Israel, and they called her right there to introduce the great-granddaughter of the building's original owners. While Polish society as a whole still has work to do about its Jewish past, this moment seemed so cleansing. Once a mere relic of destruction, it now also carried a glimmer of redemption, and might just have achieved tahara.

Four Special Shabbatot

The weeks leading up to Pesah contain several distinctive Shabbatot called the "Arba Parashiyot." Their goal is to emphasize themes from the Israelites' experience during the Exodus as we get closer to the Pesah holiday that celebrates our freedom.

We observe the Arba Prashivot by bringing out a second Torah scroll for an extra reading on the week's theme, followed by a unique Haftara that replaces the regular Prophetic selection for that week. In the Iragi tradition, it is customary to commemorate these Shabbatot with special songs, which we print in the Kol Mevasser so everyone can participate.

Shabbat Shekalim is the Shabbat before Rosh Hodesh Adar, or Adar II in leap years. Its reading discusses the half-shekel tax that funded the sacrifices in the Holy Tabernacle. This reminds us of our responsibility to maintain places of spiritual worship as a free people.

Shabbat Zakhor is the Shabbat before Purim. Its reading recounts that the nation of Amalek attacked the us from the back as we left Egypt, preying on the weak. Even as a free people, we must remember what it felt like to be victimized, and blot out any remnant of the aggressors.

Shabbat Para is two Shabbatot before Rosh Hodesh Nisan. Its reading discusses the rituals that cleanse and purify us spiritually, a state we had to achieve to offer the Paschal lamb. Alas, it is unavailable in modern times because of the destruction of the Holy Temple.

Shabbat Hahodesh is one Shabbat before Rosh Hodesh Nisan. Its reading announces that the month of Nisan is the foremost month. with Pesah as the preeminent holiday. Tishre may be when we count the years, but the months roll over in time for Pesah.

A fifth day called "Shabbat Hagadol" is observed the Shabbat before Pesah. It has no unique Torah reading, but does include a special Haftara and Iraqi songs. Historically, communal Rabbis would save their most impactful sermons for Shabbat Hagadol.
