Rabbi's Message

In the 1904 edition of *Achiasaf*, a Hebrew periodical from Warsaw, Mr. Y. Goldfarb published a lively account of his experience at the annual Lag



La'omer pilgrimage to Meron for the yahrzeit of Bar Yohai. The text, which is now available for free on Google Books, begins as follows:

A frenzied tumult reigned on the path ascending from Safed to the Galilean village of Meron. Horses whinnied, mules snorted, and donkeys brayed over the conversations of male and female pilgrims and their prattling children and elders – a raucous, turbulent din! Bedouins, Arabs, Turks, Jews, and Christians – all walked, rode, drove, or otherwise thronged to a single destination. The roadbed was full of boulders, obstacles, hillocks, vales, indentations, and other tripping hazards, yet no one paid any heed... "People – whereto?" "To Meron! To the Tsadik! To the bonfire!" This was the one answer that could be heard from any pilgrim's lips.

This scene is less colorful today in an Israel of modern roads and a more homogeneous population. Yet the pilgrimage to Meron on Lag La'omer is still very much alive, with over half a million visitors inundating the small village each year.

Without questioning the religious sincerity of the pilgrims, one could remark at the unusual nature of this practice. Where else is a yahrzeit observed as a festive occasion? The closest I can think of is Moshe Rabbenu's death on the seventh of Adar, which is marked with a program of nighttime Torah study – a much weightier atmosphere than the gaiety at Meron.

According to the Talmud, the Omer became somber because of Ribbi Akiba's students, who died in a mass epidemic during this interval (Yebamot 62b). The text refers unambiguously to the whole period until Shabuot, and it is not until the derashot of Yehoshua ibn Shuaib (ca. 1280-1340) that we hear of the plague ending early. In his sermon for the first day of Pesah, he notes that the custom was to mourn *until the 34th day*, when people would celebrate the first day of the students' survival.

Note that neither of these sources mentions Meron, Bar Yohai, or the 33rd day being a celebration. Those are based on a story reported in Peri Ets Havim (Koretz, 1785), which depicts a group of rabbis visiting Bar Yohai's grave on the 33rd for kabbalistic reasons. At graveside, one of them was overheard reciting a sad passage in the liturgy, leading another to claim that he saw a vision of Bar Yohai's spirit being angry that this was read on "the day of his rejoicing." According to a memorable Seforim Blog post by Eliezer Brodt, a 19th-century printing error in this passage transformed the 33rd of the Omer into the day "on which he died" (שמח vs. שמת). As astonishing as it sounds, this brings the status of Lag La'omer as Bar Yohai's yahrzeit into serious doubt!!

Yet perhaps that is a more constructive outcome than it seems. Now, instead of focusing on a man, we can devote ourselves back to our connection with the divine. If our bonfires and other revelry make us feel humble gratitude to God for His many blessings to our people, including the survival of Torah scholarship under Ribbi Akiba's new student body, then we will have truly restored the period of the Omer to its original intent.


