

Rabbi's Message

Shalom,



There are a myriad of explanations about this deep verse. G-d is telling Abraham that his so-journing is for his greater good. This would begin the laying of a foundation for a great nation. A nation that would inherit the teachings of the one, true, living G-d. We would inherit the Torah, which helps us bridge the physical and spiritual worlds.

Abraham started to develop his connection with G-d at a very young age. He was born into a confused world. He had to have the courage to forge his own path which didn't fit with the mainstream way of thinking. He ascended from spiritual level to level until he started to receive messages from G-d.

Just when he may have thought he had lifted himself high enough, G-d tells Abraham he needs to travel away from everything he knows. His prior exploration was the basis for his initial



conversation with G-d, but now he needed to go even further to draw on levels of spirituality the world hadn't experienced before. Abraham was constantly striving to reach higher and higher. He didn't satisfy himself with the work and service he had done on the prior day, but rather looked at each day as a new challenge.

This teaches a powerful lesson about achieving great things in this world. We must constantly work and realize we are connected with energy that is tied up with the infinite G-d. The second we become complacent we lose the innovative spirit and zest that brought us to this point.

This can be seen with the current model of business in the modern world. The top companies never rest on their laurels. They always innovate and conduct more research to gain insight into the minds and hearts of their existing customers and potential clients. Similarly, creative writers and artists seek to see things with fresh eyes and to stretch their abilities. And, in their homes, every day parents strive to learn and improve how they raise their children.

As human beings we constantly change and grow. This is one of the powerful, clear lessons of the parasha. "Lekh lekha", go out from the place where you are comfortable, reach beyond who you are today, and challenge yourself to achieve greater levels within yourself.

Ezra A. Ben-Ari

Ezra ben Moshe, z"l who passed away suddenly and unexpectedly early Tuesday, November 5th 2019 the 7th of Heshvan 5780.

Born in Iraq during the late summer of 1939, Ezra Ben-Ari immigrated to Israel during the 1950s with his parents and many brothers and sisters. He served in the Israeli army; and, he met his wife Yael, an American student, in Israel as well. They fell in love, married, and immigrated to the United States in the mid-1960s. Once here, Ezra began a life-long career in sales representing maintenance supplies and equipment.

The Ben-Ari family frequently attended Kahal Joseph, especially during the High Holy Days. Throughout the family's years of participation, Ezra had a special regard for Senior Hazzan Sassoon Ezra. After learning in Jewish day schools from a young age through high school, the Ben-Ari family's two boys remained active in the greater Jewish community, attending Kahal Joseph services often.

Ezra Ben-Ari was a good man, devoted to his sons (and grandchildren), and proud of his heritage.

He is survived by his siblings in Israel; his former wife Yael Ben-Ari; his sons Michael Ben-Ari, in Israel & Daniel Ben-Ari, in Los Angeles; five grandchildren, extended family and friends

Funeral services and shiva took place in Israel.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to his family and loved ones. May they be comforted together with all the mourners of Tsion.
