Rabbi's Message

Shalom, the book of Exodus begins with events that took place in the land of Egypt. At first, our ancestors lived comfortable,

lavish, physical existence when Joseph was second in command. A few generations later, they were performing backbreaking labor as slaves to Egypt and Pharaoh. Moshe was chosen as the messenger and emissary of G-d to take the children of Israel out of Egypt and away from this terrible slavery.

The first portion of Exodus deals with Moshe's birth, his upbringing in Pharaoh's home, and his subsequent escape from Egypt. He becomes a shepherd who travels far in the wilderness with his flock. G-d reveals himself to Moshe in the burning bush and commands him to undertake the awesome task of confronting Pharaoh.

During last week's Torah portion, Moses embarks on his mission with Aharon, and the plagues begin. Numerous times during these plagues, we hear about how Pharaoh hardens his heart. Even when faced with the overwhelming evidence of G-d's miracles, Pharoah resists acknowledging the existence of G-d. He doesn't believe in a G-d that is above nature and who can affect our physical reality. For this reason, the Torah uses the word "kaved" to describe when Pharaoh hardens his heart. The literal translation of "kaved" communicates that Pharoah's heart is "heavy." He does not allow his heart to believe in this spiritual power of G-d which is behind all reality.

Another translation of "kaved" in Hebrew is "liver." Our sages offer a funny commentary. Just as liver is very hard to cook, so too Pharaoh's heart became like a liver, because he wouldn't receive the influence of G-d in his heart. He only believed in tangible spirituality with practical effects, a spirituality that could be proven in our physical realm. For this reason, Egypt was full of necromancy and spell weaving. The only spirituality

that interested the Egyptians was one that they could manipulate for their own purposes. If spirituality involved a world beyond them and their preferences, they weren't interested in it.

Spirituality for its own sake was not compelling to them. Egypt was full of idol worship and impure actions. Nevertheless, G-d came down and revealed himself in Egypt out of his great love for our nation. This was indeed the true birth of our nation. Through this whole experience, we were broken down and then lifted up to higher levels of spirituality. Our true connection with G-d began with the entire process of liberation from Egypt. We began our elevation after our descent into slavery. We rose from our lowest level and began the countdown to receiving the Torah on Mount Sinai.

In this week's parasha, G-d commands Moshe to sanctify the new moon. This is officially the first commandment of our nation. (Although our forefathers had been commanded to fulfill circumcision, it is not considered our first commandment, because it occurred prior to the formation of our nation.) There is deep symbolism in the commandment to sanctify the new moon. If we think about it, we realize that Jewish celebrations revolve around special timings. For example, the new moon begins each Jewish month; that is Rosh Hodesh. Similarly, our annual holidays offer continual spiritual influence and an energetic influx into our lives. And, they are determined by the lunar calendar.

By giving us the mitzvah of Rosh Hodesh, G-d gave over to us the power of determining these times. When we celebrate Rosh Hodesh, determining when each Jewish month begins with the new moon, our action is symbolic; it represents how we are influencing the higher spiritual worlds through our deeds down here in this physical realm.

This is especially connected to the festival of Passover which was celebrated for the first time ever in Egypt. By rejoicing on this night and demonstrating our faith in G-d, we are reliving the entire experience of going out of Egypt on a spiritual level. We can experience a level of liberation which is truly exalted on the night of Passover. It




