## Rabbi's Message

Shalom, this week's parasha is the pinnacle of our nation leaving Egypt. Pharaoh him-

self drives us out, as he is so overwhelmed with the finality of the last plague that he finally gives up. However, very soon after having let Israel leave, Pharaoh and the Egyptians regret making this decision. Egypt begins a chase with their entire army to force Israel to return to slavery.

As the children of Israel stand at the Sea, they see Egypt's army behind them. They are extremely terrified. Although, they have been free from slavery for a year and have witnessed all the plagues that have taken place as a part of their liberation, a big part of them is still connected to the slave mentality. It's not so easy getting rid of a mentality or identity that one has been subjected to for as long they were in Egypt.

There are differing opinions among the Jewish nation as to what they should do in this situation. One faction wants to commit suicide by jumping in the Red Sea. One faction wants to return to Egypt and slavery. One faction wants to fight against the Egyptians. The last faction thinks that prayer to G-d is their best option. Moshe answers all of these groups in this verse, "Don't be afraid, stand firm and see the Lord's salvation that He will wreak for you today, for the way you have seen the Egyptians is [only] today, [but] you shall no longer continue to see them for eternity. The Lord will fight for you, but you shall remain silent."

Stand still, and don't jump in the sea! You will never see the Egyptians again after today, and you aren't returning to Egypt and slavery! Hashem will fight for you, and there is no need for you to fight against them! Be silent, and don't pray at this moment!

Hashem says to Moshe "Speak to the children of Israel, and tell them to travel onward."

Although they have left Egypt, the Jewish nation's true liberation doesn't occur until the splitting of the Sea. Hashem pushes us in the direction of the sea and away from Egypt and all that it represented.

This teaching has relevance in our lives. 'Pharaoh' and 'Egypt' represent the parts of our being and psyche and the world around us that want to limit us and keep us in 'slavery.' They represent whatever is holding us back from elevation and liberation in our existence.

We all have personal challenges and struggles. That is one of the conditions of being human. One response to these limitations is to escape this world and our struggles by 'jumping into the sea of spirituality,' so we are no longer challenged by forces that limit us.

Some say, "Why deal with this world and our issues if they are so challenging?" That person may prefer to give up on the challenges they face, even if there is great loss connected to giving up. We know that this is not a rational response, as it doesn't really help us deal with life's challenges. Rather, giving up is a form of escape. Problems we run away from remain problems, and may even become greater when we ignore them.

Another response is, "I will never overcome my issues and these worldly challenges, so I may as well give in to them." This is like going back to Egypt and slavery. We must never give up, because then we have surely lost the battle. This path usually leads to a life of pain, guilt and regret.

Some take the approach of fighting themselves and their struggles. They feel that life is pure struggle, and this is the path they take with everything and everyone. This is a tiresome approach, and it is not very feasible in the long run. We accomplish much more by taking a loving, peaceful approach in life. Of course we must face our issues, but we must do so with compassion and understanding towards ourselves and others.

And lastly, some take the approach of "praying." They leave everything up to G-d. We know that this is not what Hashem wants from us. He wants our prayers, yet


