

#### Rabbi's Message

reached Mount Sinai, the Hebrew wording used to describe their encampment at the mountain says, "Vayichan sham Yisrael neged ha'har," the beginning of which translates as "Israel encamped there." Interestingly, the verb "vayichan" or "encamped" is in its singular form, the form used for just one person as in, for example, "he encamped"—not "they." The commentaries state, "They encamped there as one person with one heart." Their excitement for receiving G-d's word united them as a nation like never before. At Mount Sinai, the Jewish people truly achieved a level of unity that made them as one, in body and spirit. This unity elevated their consciousness to a higher level of being.

When we are joined together, our power is much greater than when we are apart. As we see in our daily lives, the weight that two people are able to lift together is significantly greater than what they can each lift separately. The message for us is this: Our unity as a nation is the most important thing we can give HaShem. In many ways, we are like children in relation to Him. As many people know, there is no greater pleasure for a parent than when their children have unity and peace between them.

When we read the Ten Commandments annually it is considered as if we are receiving the Torah anew, as if it is being given to us for the first time. This is a moment of great empowerment for us all. For this reason, it is highly encouraged that children attend this part of the Torah reading, just as our entire nation was present when the Torah was given the first time. Indeed, we are told that even Jewish souls not yet born were there, including the souls of all future converts to Judaism. It was absolutely necessary that we were all there together and spiritually present so that we might achieve the high level of unity required to become the nation of G-d.

We also learn that before the Torah was given, there was a separation between the higher and lower spiritual realms. Spirituality did not really permeate humanity's physical realm. Although there were spiritual people who existed, the actions they took didn't fully impact or alter the make-up of physical objects around them. However, once the Torah was given, this innate boundary was shattered and physical objects started to be permeated with holiness.

Indeed this is one of the main purposes of the Torah's commandments: the mitzvot. Through our physical performance of the mitzvot, we draw down powerful godliness and spirituality not only into our lives and spirits but also into the physical world, the substances around us. As the Talmud states, "The Torah wasn't given to the angels," but rather to us, the inhabitants of this physical reality, this object-oriented world.

When Moses ascended to heaven to receive the Torah, the angels complained to HaShem: "Why is this son of a woman doing your holy work G-d?" They could not understand how a being who existed in the physical world, in a body, could be entrusted with such spiritual power and responsibility—receiving the Torah. HaShem told Moshe how to answer the angels. Moshe retorted, "Did you go down to Egypt? Do you have parents that you must be commanded to honor? Do you have the temptation to steal? Do you have any evil inclination for that matter?"

The angels were not entirely wrong. We live in an imperfect, physical world. It can be confusing at times, and it presents us with challenges and dilemmas.

However, 'Torah' is connected to the word for 'teaching in Hebrew. Without challenges, we have no opportunity to learn, no chance to transmute and change this physical world, to elevate it, too, along with ourselves. Perfect beings, like the angels, cannot do this—they cannot do what we can do, precisely because they do not have the opportunity that we have: the chance to change and learn.


