KJ HAPPENINGS

Rabbi's Message

Shalom. This week's parasha, *Ki Tisa*, discusses the conclusion of G-d's instructions to Moses regarding the making of the Mishkan—also known as the Sanctuary, the Tent of Meeting, or the Tabernacle—in the desert.



The last Torah portions, *Terumah* and *Tetzaveh*, have discussed G-d's detailed instructions about how the people of Israel should construct the Mishkan in which He promises to "dwell amidst them." Something described in our parasha is how silver for making the "foundation sockets" of the Mishkan should be collected.

The materials for the Mishkan's construction were received "from every man whose heart impels him to give," with people each contributing as much of whatever material their *generosity* and ability dictated. This rule applied to 14 of 15 materials used for the Mishkan's construction. However, there was one material—silver—which G-d instructed should be contributed *equally* by each individual Jew:

G-d spoke to Moses, saying:

When you raise the head of the children of Israel by their numbers, they shall each give a ransom for his soul to G-d...

This they shall give, every one that passes among those who are numbered: half a shekel according to the shekel of the Sanctuary...a half-shekel shall be the offering of G-d . . .

Why was the silver contribution only *half* a shekel, not a complete coin? To teach us that no person is a complete entity unto themselves. Only by joining with another can a person become a "whole being."

In these challenging times, this teaching is quite relevant. Although we clearly need to take physical precautions to protect our health, we must strengthen our spiritual unity and care for our families and our communities.

Moreover, the half-shekels were designated "for the service of the Tent of Meeting, [the Mishkan], that it be a memorial to the children of Israel before G-d, to make atonement for your souls."

There were a few things Moses could not understand about this statement: How could a mere silver coin serve a person as "an atonement for their soul to G-d"? Additionally, "silver" and "soul" are polar opposites: the soul epitomizes the spiritual, and silver epitomizes earthliness. Not only is silver taken from the earth, it is usually found deep within the earth. How could silver be an atonement for the soul?

G-d answered Moses by showing him a "coin of fire" that helped Moses understand the message: when we perform even a modest act of charity or kindness with the inner fire of passion and enthusiasm, we are indeed offering a piece of our soul.

Furthermore, G-d is not bound by the rules of any order or logical system that we perceive, be it nature or something else. G-d demonstrates and reveals that, in giving the half-shekel and in other acts where we give of ourselves, opposites can become one and unify. Silver, part of the earth, represents what is spiritually passive and inactive. Yet when we give, silver transforms into fire—the "coin of fire." Fire, a form of energy and change, represents that which is highly spiritually active. Silver transforms into the "coin of fire" through our souls, by virtue of their essence that is connected to G-d. Our soul's essence never sins. When we involve the essence of our souls, along with our entire being, in what we do, we may harmoniously blend opposites like fire and silver.

Finally, regarding the half-shekel the Torah states: "The rich shall not give more, and the poor shall not give less." People differ in their intellect, character, and talents, in the quantity of their material resources and the nature of their spiritual sensitivities. But all are equal in the very basis of their bond with G-d: the intrinsic commitment to Hashem that resides in the core of their souls.
