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


bringing music to our life. We are thankful to Sr. Hazzan Sass Ezra for his continued dedication and the hardworking office staff Sarah and Dafna.

Rabbi's Message

Can individuals change the world?

s we begin the Hebrew year of 5766, we have to review our past actions and plan our goals for the future. We must brace ourselves for unprecedented events as religious and political powers in the world take new directions.

In 5765, we have had a year of joy and happiness, but we have also experienced pain and suffering. In Israel, in Europe, and around the world, innocent people have been attacked for no other reason than that they were different. Judaism teaches us that we should care not only about ourselves and about those who are like us, but also about the whole world. We should strive to change this world and human society and to nullify, in our sages' words, "the evil decrees."

How do we do that? Can individuals change the world? The answer is, yes.

There are three elements that can lead us to a better society and to more peaceful living and they are *Teshuva*, *Tefila*, and *Tzedaka* – repentance, prayer, and charity. Repentance is the capacity for looking back at our actions and decisions, criticizing ourselves, and trying to make up for our wrongdoing. It is not always possible to fully compensate those who were hurt by us, though, and that is why a central part of *Teshuva* is to accept upon us that we will never repeat that mistake.

The complete process of repentance as described by Maimonides is as follows. The first stage is the recognition of the sin. It is not easy to admit that we have done something wrong, but without this acknowledgement the repentance will be superficial, as we will only be trying to please the other side without experiencing true regret. The second stage is the confession, as we say out loud what our sin was and express our regret. This vocalization makes sure that we reveal our feelings and stand by our decision. The third stage is the commitment to never again perform the sin or make the mistake.

This three-step process of repentance applies when we refer to a sin that concerns God, like not keeping Shabbat or not eating kosher food; but when we deal with a transgression against another human being, for example in sins such as stealing, cheating or badmouthing, the process of *Teshuva* is not complete until

we have asked the person for forgiveness and have paid back damages.

The second component for changing the world is *Tefila*, or prayer. When we pray we acknowledge that we are not omnipotent, that there are many things that we lack, and that we rely on God for help. We also allow ourselves to focus on the inner self and to con-



nect with our spirituality. Additionally, when we pray with a crowd we draw upon the power of the many, and we thus elevate our community as well.

Finally, the third component for improving the world is *Tzedaka*, or charity. Charity is the way to translate our decisions and our newfound spirituality into action. Giving not only involves a physical transaction, but also a process of identifying with others, understanding their needs, and shifting the center of gravity from us and ourselves to the rest of the world and to human beings in general.

Our sages have noted an interesting phenomenon: *Teshuva*, *Tefila*, and *Tzedaka* can also be named *Tzom*, *Kol*, and *Mamon*. These three words each have the numerical value of 136, signifying that they are all of equal importance. We must engage in all three processes in order to succeed in our mission of improving the world. When combined, the numerical value of the three words equals 408, which is the numerical value of the Hebrew, word *Zol*.

Zol is a word that appears in the verse dealing with the service of the High Priest on Yom Kippur: With Zot Λharon shall enter the Holy of Holies. The rabbis explained that in order to reach the level of entering the Holy of Holies, we must follow the guidelines of repentance, prayer, and charity.

May we have the merit of following these concepts, changing our lives, and improving the world around us, thus bringing upon ourselves blessings and the best year ever,

In Israel, every teenager is drafted into the army upon graduating from high school. 

Member Spotlight

Community Author Gets Rave Reviews

The following are excerpts from the Jerusalem Post article written by Yona Sabbar about

"The Emergence of Modern Hebrew Creativity in Babylon" A book by Lev Hakak.

t is often assumed that since the "Golden Age" of Hebrew literature in Spain, jews in Muslim Coun-Ltries had not produced secular Hebrew literature worthy of our literary canon. [In his book, Lev Hakak] reveals the colorful budding of secular Hebrew literature in Iraq from 1735 to 1950. The jews of Iraq wrote in Hebrew, Arabic, and Judeo Arabic. The Arabic literature they published targeted the general public. Writing in Arabic reflected their desire to participate in Iraqi nationalism and express universal themes at once. Most of these authors such as Anwar Shaul, Shalom Darwish and Samir Nagash, continued writing in Arabic after arriving in Israel. Others such as Shmuel Moreh and Sasson Somekh (both winners of the Israel Prize) turned to academic life and research. Some such as Shimon Balas and Sam Michael, shifted to writing in Hebrew.

An example of the influence of European literature on Hebrew creativity in Iraq can be found in the poem "Daughter of Babylon" by Shelomo Yishaq Nissim (pp. 158-159): "Awake daughter of Babylon, the Mother of the Talmud...Show strength in knowledge of languages and sciences, But do not desert the (biblical) prophets. Open a book of history, And find out how great was Israel." Hakak offers a brief comparison of this poem with one by Yehuda Leib Gordon, "Awaken, My People" (1863), and concludes that while Gordon's suggestion was that a jew should be a jew at home and a man in the street (which became the motto of "enlightened" jews), Shelomo Yishaq Nissim endorsed being a jew and a man at home and in the street. It appears that Shelomo Yishaq Nissmís poem is also a dialogue with these jews who hoped to assimilate into Iraqi society: he is calling on them to remain faithful to the deep roots of Judaism, to the Hebrew language and the land of Israel while

incorporating modernity and universalism.

Another author Hakak writes about is Shelomo Bekhor Hutsin (1843-1892). Hakak describes him as a man of intellectual energy who, among his other Hebrew activities, published more than 150



articles and missives in periodicals of his time, and who reported about various events in the Jewish life of Iraq, Kurdistan and Persia. In his written work, Hutsin emphasized tradition, faith, and knowledge of Judaism. He was also an advocate of studying foreign languages, honoring women, learning a craft and acquiring scientific knowledge. He did not find any contradiction between faith and secular knowledge and values.

Hakak presents secular Hebrew poetry, stories, articles, literary research and even a play that he gathered from various books and periodicals published in Europe, Israel, Iraq and India. Hakak's book will add an important, until now unknown aspect of the history of Hebrew literature, expanding its dimensions in Near Eastern countries.

Professor Lev Hakak, a longstanding member of Kahal Joseph Congregation, graduated from the Hebrew University in Jerusalem majoring in Hebrew Literature, Political science and Law. His graduate studies in Hebrew Literature were continued first at Tel-Aviv university and then at the University of California where he received his PhD. He began his academic career at the University of California, Berkeley and then moved to UCLA. He is also a licensed attorney in Israel and in California.

Yona Sabbar is a professor of Hebrew and Aramaic Studies, and a graduate adviser in the department of Near Eastern languages and cultures at UCLA.





When the Talmud talks about the importance of having a good name, it was talking about my grandfather. He taught us by example about integrity and ethics, and in doing so he passed on to us his good name. We are lucky for it.

When I was seventeen he taught me his business. We sat together for many hours typing out correspondence to his customers and suppliers all over the world using his old typewriter. He typed with two fingers, when he saw that I could type with three fingers, he promptly passed me the typewriter.

That was him—always jumping at to do something better or faster.

My grandfather is survived by his wife of over 85 years, Helen, his brother Maurice Zekaria, and his four children: Gail, Joseph, Sharon and Stephen, and ten grandchildren.
