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Rabbi's Message

Shalom Uvracha,

Last week's parasha listed the offspring Of Esav briefly. However, when discussing Jacob, the Torah elaborates at

length. This difference in approach can be compared to a pearl that falls into the sand: a person searches in the sand and sifts it with a sieve until he finds the pearl. When he finds it, he casts the sand and pebbles from his hand, but keeps the pearl.

Joseph is named as the sole son of Jacob, completely bypassing the other sons and tribes. Joseph is considered the spiritual extension of Jacob. Both went through numerous challenges and difficulties and lived through many similar experiences. Their mothers were both barren for a long time and had difficulty when giving birth to them. Both were hated by their brothers. And, despite their birth order, both merited to be considered the 'first born.' Finally, they both achieved greatness through their dreams.

Joseph continues the spiritual action of conquering the darkness of this world, a process that Jacob also represents. In addition, Joseph is the spiritual

by the Djahanbani Family entity with the power to defeat Esav. This is why Joshua, a descendant of Joseph, led the Jewish people's war against the vicious, heartless Amalek, who descended from Esav's line.

Although we are not all physical descendants of Joseph, he represents a very strong spiritual energy that we are all able to tap into. He represents the 'Tzadik,' one who does what is fair, balanced, and good; one who remains close to Hashem. That behavior, that way of being, is what is meant by "righteous" —not someone arrogant, nor selfsatisfied, nor close-minded. As such, Joseph is considered our foundation. The ability to know what is positive and right, and to act on that knowledge, enables us to overcome challenges and stay true to our essence and beliefs.

Joseph was held to a very high standard by Hashem, as are all people who are truly righteous. When Joseph was sold as a slave he was very successful in his master's house and was given complete control over the house. The Torah then states, "Now it came to pass that since he had appointed him over his house and over all that he had, the Lord blessed the house of the Egyptian for Joseph's sake, and the blessing of the Lord was in all that he had, in the house and in the field. So he left all that he had in Joseph's hand, and he knew nothing about what was with him except the bread that he ate." **Click to read more**

Annual Commemoration – Displacement of Jews from Arab Lands

On June 23, 2014 the Knesset adopted a law which designates November 30th as an annual, national day of commemoration for the 850,000 Jewish refugees who were displaced from Arab countries and Iran in the 20th century.

Jews had lived in the Arab lands for thousands of years, and many of their communities preceded the advent of Islam. But in the 20th century, with the rise of Arab nationalism and the conflict in Palestine, the new Arab regimes began a campaign of massive violations of the rights of their Jewish citizens. Arab states expropriated property of their native Jews, and denaturalized, expelled, arrested, tortured and murdered many of them.

In light of recent global protests in support of Palestinians, it is critical that we make our voices heard within and outside the Jewish community concerning the imbalance of reporting and lack of accountability and acknowledgment of past injustices towards Jewish citizens of Arab countries.

Our program will include addresses from distinguished speakers, witness accounts, a short film clip, and a memorial prayer for those Jews buried in Arab lands. This event will be hosted at the synagogue and also available on Zoom. Refreshments will be served at the end of the evening.
